Minister's Letter April, 2016

Greetings of peace and all good.

"Be not afraid." I spoke these words to a long time neighbor/friend of our family on April 2, as he sat with his oxygen tubing, working hard to breathe for his frail body, and trying to not cry too much at the loss of his dear wife the day before. She died of lung cancer, and he also has lung cancer, although hers was diagnosed 3+ years before he began having symptoms. Their story is one of incredible love, moving through cancer together, encouraging each other and comforting each other.

What else could I really say that might give hope as he faces his journey home to God as well, probably quite soon. And who am I to know not to be afraid? God constantly has to remind me to stay in this moment and trust God for what may unfold in the next.

1 John 4: 18 "Love has no room for fear; rather, perfect love casts out all fear"

In God's love, we may be able to move past our fears. But perfect love? That we can strive for, always looking to Christ as the example, and knowing our very human condition will constantly challenge us.

Another friend died this same weekend. I will never forget seeing him look at me and say "I'm dying". And I echoed, yes, you are dying. And we (other friends also) are here to support you. You can let go, become one with God's breath. You will be free.

In every step of our lives, we have opportunities to let go of fears and be free. It is the faith of a child that Jesus wants us to have, so we can be held without reservations in God's arms of love, guided through all the joys and sorrows that life presents.

The Prayer of Jesus.

"Father, the hour has come. Give glory to your son, so that your son may glorify you, just as you gave him authority over all people, so that he may give eternal life to all you gave him. Now this is eternal life, that they should know you, the only true God, and the one whom you sent, Jesus Christ. I glorified you on earth by accomplishing the work that you gave me to do. Now glorify me, Father, with you, with the glory that I had with you before the world began.

"I revealed your name to those whom you gave me out of the world. They belonged to you, and you gave them to me, and they have kept your word. Now they know that everything you gave me is from you, because the words you gave to me I have given to them, and they accepted them and truly understood that I came from you, and they have believed that you sent me. I pray for them. I do not pray for the world but for the ones you have given me, because they are yours, and everything of mine is yours and everything of yours is mine, and I have been glorified in them. And now I will no longer be in the world, but they are in the world, while I am coming to you. Holy Father, keep them in your name that you have given me, so that they may be one just as we are. When I was with them I protected them in your name that you gave me, and I guarded them, and none of them was lost except the son of destruction, in order that the scripture might be fulfilled. But now I am coming to you. I speak this in the world so that they may share my joy completely. I gave them your word, and the world hated them, because they do not belong to the world any more than I belong to the world. I do not ask that you take them out of the world but that you keep them from the evil one. They do not belong to the world any more than I belong to the world. Consecrate them in the truth. Your word is truth. As you sent me into the world, so I sent them into the world. And I consecrate myself for them, so that they also may be consecrated in truth.

"I pray not only for them, but also for those who will believe in me through their word, so that they may all be one, as you, Father, are in me and I in you, that they also may be in us, that the world may believe that you sent me. And I have given them the glory you gave me, so that they may be one, as we are one, I in them and you in me, that they may be brought to perfection as one, that the world may know that you sent me, and that you loved them even as you loved me. Father, they are your gift to me. I wish that where I am they also may be with me, that they may see my glory that you gave me, because you loved me before the foundation of the world. Righteous Father, the world also does not know you, but I know you, and they know that you sent me. I made known to them your name and I will make it known, that the love with which you loved me may be in them and I in them."

The Rule of the Secular Franciscan Order

As Secular Franciscans we are constantly challenged to mindfully follow the rule of St Francis

~ Rule 23 ~

Requests for admission to the Secular Franciscan Order must be presented to the local fraternity, whose council decides upon the acceptance of new brothers and sisters. Admission into the Order is gradually attained through a time of initiation, a period of formation of at least one year, and profession of the rule. The entire community is engaged in this process of growth by its own manner of living. The age for profession and the distinctive Franciscan sign are regulated by the statutes.

Profession by its nature is a permanent commitment. Members who find themselves in particular difficulties should discuss their problems with the council in fraternal dialogue. Withdrawal or permanent dismissal from the Order, if necessary, is an act of the fraternity council according to the norm of the constitutions.

Reflection: Besides a greater concern for the land, what other values do family farms contribute to the good of society?


Scripture: 2 Timothy 2: 6 "The hardworking farmer ought to have the first share of the crop."

Justice Peace and the Integrity of Creation

A Good Friday reflection on the experience at Lawrence Livermore Nuclear Weapons R&D Laboratory

Individuals from the San Francisco Bay area had a beautiful Good Friday at LLL, pondering Empire and Cross while Sowing the Seeds of Hope. Kathleen and I shared our Good Friday morning with others wishing to bring attention to the ongoing development of nuclear weapons to the people of these United States. This gathering follows the announcement of continuing budgetary increases in future investments in nuclear weapons and nuclear energy which this nation can ill afford. We're told that a nuclear missile is being designed which enters low evading radar.

Personally, I felt in touch with the crucified Christ in a manner that I had not for many years and it was intoxicating, freeing, and spirit-filled. I also felt touched by a saint, just holding hands with the Holy Criminal, Father Louie Vitale, OFM, whose steadfast example of nonviolent civil disobedience puts the others gathered at some numerical disadvantage and in awe. While the gathering of clergy and laity was a sparse 110 or so souls, this symbolic protest was eminently meaningful to those in touch with the lunacy of nuclear proliferation. Gently, I wondered where were all the others who feel as we do.

I had been praying all Lent, thinking, contemplating, some fasting, never enough, and feeling this need to put a body on this line again. It came to me incessantly the juxtaposition of working in good conscience to request meager funding of services for impoverished, disadvantaged children with disabilities and their families, when I also know the volumes of money sucked out of our enormous federal and state budgets down an evil sink hole, to honor our culture of death. I stand with St. Francis and walk in a garden with St. Clare and cannot fathom this insane intent to kill and decimate the fragile populations and ecology of planet Earth. While many might see the peacefully assembled protesters; a thin 83 year old Franciscan, Dominican nuns, anti-nuclear peace activists now gray, creased with worry lines, people from suburbia, teachers, dancers, young idealists, as pathetic, I, however, saw them as brave souls in witness to Christ crucified, reviled, and persecuted. We gathered, we sang, we prayed, we knelt and we asked for conversion to peace. It was all heart-felt and yet for the others, the hardened hearts of military police, military officers, and local Livermore police it was just a well-orchestrated, easy day for them. Good Friday served up with a bit of mischief from the masses, not even annoying, since the numbers were low this year.

There was permission to gather, to park, to hear the Stations of the Cross, to walk to the gate. Here was ritual liturgical dance, a salute to life. Each station of the cross evokes Christ's bleeding wounds for our very much "made- in-America" weapons of mass destruction- for costly encroachments on humanity in Immigration, the suffering of refugees out of Palestine-Gaza, Syria, and elsewhere in the Middle East and Africa. I asked for peace filled purpose in lives turned from killing. I thanked every officer-soldier I encountered, blessed the beautiful sun, and apologized if I had taken any of them away from their children, family or friends. I talked of PTSD with an older soldier back from Afghanistan and the Golan Heights bordering Israel to Syria. I said this cannot go on. He agreed with a nod. The others all assured me that I had not affected them and in the end some 21 holy individuals were cited for "unlawful assembly" with court dates pending.

So there was no real break in the good order of making bombs that will destroy life as we all know it on Earth. There were, however several friends and merry Franciscans present to offer protest, but there was no pause to the madness of war, torture, dislocation, starvation, and deprivation. I left worrying as I do, praying on how to heal the cracks through which the most adorable, trusting children plunge. With children afflicted by mental illness, illiteracy, rare conditions, syndromes such as Autism, we need to reflect at this time of year, with Christ on the cross. Vulnerable, at-risk children are reminders to me – just as vivid as the bodies that fell from the twin World Trade Towers on 9-11. We are harming our own with this lunacy at every step; with each billion we misspend, we are also sanitizing and justifying murder. I can be only a small speck of sand in the way, praying to be a pebble, seeking to inspire an avalanche of boulders from creation that might perform a random act of kindness by rolling in front of the gates of war – to please make this evil stop.
