Recently I have had the privilege of being part of a Naturalist certification course. There is so much beauty in nature, and so much to learn about how all of creation is interconnected. The greatest gift from this study, however, has been the "homework" of spending quiet time at a "sit' spot, and just observing. As scripture has shown us, Jesus often took time out to pray in places far from the crowds. Constant busy life does not leave much space for the Spirit to have voice in our hearts, or give us a chance to renew our strength.

My hope is that in this coming month, we can each find our "sit" spot and discover a different aspect of our connection to God and all of creation. Share the practice with others who may be under extreme stress. God is ever present and our times of stillness and receptivity allow God's love to pour into our whole being.

Scripture reading for Friday of the Eighth Week in Ordinary Time Gospel: MARK 11:11-26

Jesus entered Jerusalem and went into the temple area.

He looked around at everything and, since it was already late, went out to Bethany with the Twelve.

The next day as they were leaving Bethany he was hungry. Seeing from a distance a fig tree in leaf, he went over to see if he could find anything on it. When he reached it he found nothing but leaves; it was not the time for figs. And he said to it in reply, "May no one ever eat of your fruit again!"

And his disciples heard it.

They came to Jerusalem, and on entering the temple area he began to drive out those selling and buying there. He overturned the tables of the money changers and the seats of those who were selling doves. He did not permit anyone to carry anything through the temple area.

Then he taught them saying, "Is it not written:

My house shall be called a house of prayer for all peoples? But you have made it a den of thieves."

The chief priests and the scribes came to hear of it and were seeking a way to put him to death, yet they feared him because the whole crowd was astonished at his teaching.

When evening came, they went out of the city.

Early in the morning, as they were walking along, they saw the fig tree withered to its roots. Peter remembered and said to him, "Rabbi, look! The fig tree that you cursed has withered."

Jesus said to them in reply, "Have faith in God. Amen, I say to you, whoever says to this mountain, 'Be lifted up and thrown into the sea,' and does not doubt in his heart but believes that what he says will happen, it shall be done for

Therefore I tell you, all that you ask for in prayer, believe that you will receive it and it shall be yours. When you stand to pray, forgive anyone against whom you have a grievance, so that your heavenly Father may in turn forgive you your transgressions."

For our nation, as it prepares for another series of elections for representatives, that the electorate is guided to choose those who will seek the common good for everyone;


For the victims and survivors of the 7.8 earthquake in Ecuador;

Novena to the Holy Spirit for the Seven Gifts

It is still the only novena officially prescribed by the Church. Addressed to the Third Person of the Blessed Trinity, it is a powerful plea for the light and strength and love so sorely needed by every Christian.
