A friend and co-worker lost his house, and many others are temporarily displaced. Tragedies are a constant given, it seems, whether man-made or natural. In this case, it really doesn't matter - the tragedy is sitting in our laps like a big elephant. I saw a meme that showed God saying, "stop praying and unfold your hands - you have work to do!" I am sure some would read this as anti-prayer - I prefer to see it as a challenge to go from "gospel to life." Franciscans love this saying and rightly so. Yet, it is especially poignant at a time like this that the big elephant in our laps does require both our hands to keep it under control. Prayer has its place, don't question that. But in these coming days and weeks, our friends, our neighbors, our communities will need to see the "good news" in action.

Some of us have already responded, but we all are called - now and with great volume! - to do what we can. Shelter those who lost homes. Clothe those who fled at 2AM with only what they wore. Feed all who hunger ... and at all times embrace those living with fears and tears over lost lives, lost hope and an uncertain future. As we read in the Gospels, this is not a time to hide our talents and gifts under a bushel - this is a time to be a Franciscan light to our world in need. Reflections on Pope Francis's **Prayer Intentions for October**

Workers and the Unemployed:

That all workers may receive respect and protection of their rights, and that the unemployed may receive the opportunity to contribute to the common good.

Work brings a basic dignity to our human participation in God's creation. Although we can cooperate in God's work through our labor, and we can exercise creativity in the arts, speech, and thought, we cannot truly create out of nothing. Only God creates in this fashion, ex nihilo, and it was in this way that He created the world.

Pope Francis has since the beginning of his Pontificate put great emphasis on our Christian duty to respect workers and the kinds of work they do. In a 2013 audience from Labor Day, he exhorted the People of God, calling for an end to slave labor and human trafficking, encouraging us to look for creative ways to help our brothers and sisters find fulfilling work.

The Holy Father connected this to one of the pillars of Catholic social teaching, the intrinsic dignity of every human person: "I wish to extend an invitation to everyone to greater solidarity and to encourage those in public office to spare no effort to give new impetus to employment. This means caring for the dignity of the person." As we pray with the Holy Father for workers this month, it is good for us to consider how we are building up those for whom we work, those with whom we work, and those who work for us. We must be especially attentive to our shopping habits and the way in which we use the Internet. The products of sweatshops and human trafficking are widespread, and it takes careful diligence and a deep life of prayer to avoid the temptation to exploit workers directly or indirectly.

How can I assist in providing opportunities for fair work and fair wages in my family, social, and professional life? What are my obligations to the underemployed or unemployed? What am I doing to engage the issue of underemployment on a personal, local or regional level?

Scripture

The Rule of the Secular Franciscan Order

As Secular Franciscans we are constantly challenged to mindfully follow the rule of St Francis

- Rule 17 -

In their family they should cultivate the Franciscan spirit of peace, fidelity, and respect for life, striving to make of it a sign of a world already renewed in Christ. By living the grace of matrimony, husbands and wives in particular should bear witness in the world to the love of Christ for His Church. They should joyfully accompany their children on their human and spiritual journey by providing a simple and open Christian education and being attentive to the vocation of each child.

Article 24

1. Rule 17 Secular Franciscans should consider their own family to be the first place in which to live their Christian commitment and Franciscan vocation. They should make space within it for prayer, for the Word of God, and for Christian catechesis. They should concern themselves with respect for all life in every situation from conception until death. Married couples find in the Rule of the SFO an effective aid in their own journey of Christian life, aware that, in the sacrament of matrimony, their love shares in the love that Christ has for his Church. The way spouses love each other and affirm the value of fidelity is a profound witness for their own family, the Church, and the world.

2. In the fraternity:

- the spirituality of the family and of marriage and the Christian attitude towards family problems should be a theme for dialogue and for the sharing of experiences;
- they should share the important moments of the family life of their Franciscan brothers and sisters and they should give fraternal attention to those – single, widows, single parents, separated, divorced – who are living difficult situations;
- Rule 19 they should create conditions suitable for dialogue between generations;
- the formation of groups of married couples and of family groups should be fostered.
- **3.** The brothers and sisters should collaborate with the efforts undertaken in the Church and in society to affirm both the value of fidelity and respect for life and to provide answers to the social problems of the family.

Lord, hear our prayers





Oct. 11 — Feast day of St. Pope John XXIII, OFS, one of the most beloved popes and also one of our newest saints. The Roman Catholic Church celebrates his feast day not on the date of his death (3 June), as is usual, nor his birth, or even on the day of his papal coronation (as is the case with several canonized popes, such as John Paul II) but on 11 October – the day of the first session of the Second Vatican Council. This is understandable, since the Council was his idea and it was he that had convened it.
