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The Adventus wreath . . .

A few years ago I was blessed with the chance to spend a good part of advent in Germany, and I still have memories which shape my view of this period of expectation. Some of those involve the practice of the advent wreath, a tradition that visually helps us measure our period of waiting. Those who know me know I can't pass up a chance to step into a church and visit when travelling – and in Germany, the Lutheran churches were amazing in their sacredness and beauty. Some of these churches used the advent wreath in new and different ways, at least in my experience. One church, for example, used large candle stands (at least 8 feet tall and sturdy!) to physically embrace the congregation, and there was no way to avoid feeling as though one was a living part of this journey of waiting and anticipation. Other churches used a wreath of good diameter (think 6 or 7 feet in diameter) hung near the sanctuary for all to see, but in addition to the traditional four candles, there are 6 additional candles in between those, counting – literally – every day of advent. There are many ways to use an advent wreath, and I would like to share some thoughts on how you may use the wreath when lighting the four candles on the Sundays of advent.



1st CANDLE – (purple) THE PROPHECY CANDLE or CANDLE OF HOPE: We can have hope because God is faithful and will keep the promises made to us. Our hope comes from God! Reading from Romans 15:12-13 2nd CANDLE – (purple) THE BETHLEHEM CANDLE or THE CANDLE OF PREPARATION: God kept his promise of a Savior who would be born in Bethlehem. Preparation means to "get ready". Help us to be ready to welcome you, O God! Reading from Luke 3:4-6. 3rd CANDLE – (pink) THE SHEPHERD CANDLE or THE CANDLE OF JOY: The shepherds received a message of joy! Reading from Luke 2:7-15. 4th CANDLE – (purple) THE ANGEL CANDLE or THE CANDLE OF LOVE: The angels announced the good news of a Savior! Reading from Luke 2:10b-11.

Remember: Advent is a time to step back and stand with the least, and without fear, to securely "stand before the Son of Man" (Luke 21:36). Have a Blessed Advent!

Feast of Mary Queen of the Seraphic Order

Mt 11:16-19 - Jesus said to the crowds:

"To what shall I compare this generation? It is like children who sit in marketplaces and call to one another,

'We played the flute for you, but you did not dance, we sang a dirge but you did not mourn.'

For John came neither eating nor drinking, and they said,

'He is possessed by a demon.'

The Son of Man came eating and drinking and they said,

'Look, he is a glutton and a drunkard, a friend of tax collectors and sinners.'

But wisdom is vindicated by her works."



Pope Francis Prayer Intentions for December:

That the elderly, sustained by families and Christian communities, may apply their wisdom and experience to spreading the faith and forming the new generations.

Reflections

Consider yourself kneeling before Christ on His Cross. Ask yourself: How have I shared the faith with young people? How am I sharing the faith? How ought I to share the faith? (Conversely, younger people might ask how they share the faith with their elders.)

Scripture

Mt 19:13-14 – Then children were brought to him that he might lay his hands on them and pray. The disciples rebuked them, but Jesus said, "Let the children come to me, and do not prevent them; for the kingdom of heaven belongs to such as these."

The Rule of the Secular Franciscan Order

As Secular Franciscans we are constantly challenged to mindfully follow the rule of St Francis

Rule 19

Mindful that they are bearers of peace which must be built up unceasingly, they should seek out ways of unity and fraternal harmony through dialogue, trusting in the presence of the divine seed in everyone and in the transforming power of love and pardon. Messengers of perfect joy in every circumstance, they should strive to bring joy and hope to others. Since they are immersed in the resurrection of Christ, which gives true meaning to Sister Death, let them serenely tend toward the ultimate encounter with the Father.

Article 23

- 1. **Rule 19** Peace is the work of justice and the fruit of reconciliation and of fraternal love. Secular Franciscans are called to be bearers of peace in their families and in society: they should see to the proposal and spreading of peaceful ideas and attitudes; they should develop their own initiatives and should collaborate, individually and as a fraternity, with initiatives of the Pope, the local Churches, and the Franciscan Family; they should collaborate with those movements and institutions which promote peace while respecting its authentic foundations.
- 2. While acknowledging both the personal and national right to legitimate defense, they should respect the choice of those who, because of conscientious objection, refuse to bear arms.
- 3. To preserve peace in the family, the brothers and sisters should, in due time, make a last will and testament for the disposition of their goods.

Article 26

- 1. Even in suffering, Francis experienced confidence and joy from:
 - the experience of the fatherhood of God;
 - the invincible faith of rising with Christ to eternal life;
- the experience of being able to meet and praise the Creator in the universal fraternity of all creatures.

Rule 19 Following the Gospel, Secular Franciscans, therefore, affirm their hope and their joy in living. They make a contribution to counter widespread distress and pessimism, preparing a better future.

2. In the fraternity, the brothers and sisters should promote mutual understanding and they should see to it that the atmosphere of their meetings is welcoming and that it reflects joy. They should encourage one another for the good.

Article 27

- 1. **Rule 19** The brothers and sisters, progressing in age, should learn to accept illness and increasing difficulties and to give a deeper sense to their life. This should be undertaken with increasing detachment as they set out for the Promised Land. They should be firmly convinced that the community of those who believe in Christ and who love one another in Him will go forward into eternal life as the "communion of saints."
- 2. Secular Franciscans should commit themselves to create in their environment and, above all, in their fraternities, a climate of faith and hope so that "Sister Death" may be regarded as a passage to the Father, and all may prepare themselves with serenity.
